### 2015 General Election







Over the bank holiday weekend ahead of the 2015 General Election, we asked members of the Society Cornwall community research panel whether they were yet to make up their minds on who to vote for on  $7^{th}$  May. Also, what issues will influence their voting intentions.

#### The headlines are:

- One in seven (14%) have yet to make up their mind on who they will vote for, but all these do intend to vote:
- Of those decided, 43% say they are voting differently in 2015 than they did in 2010;
- People will base their vote on different beliefs, though one in five will vote for the candidate they believe will best represent local issues in Westminster;
- The most important issues for Cornish voters influencing their vote on May 7<sup>th</sup> are the NHS (63%) and the economy (49%.)

#### Results in detail:





We asked those participants changing their vote in 2015 why they were doing so. They present many reasons, though a common theme emerging is a feeling of being let down by the candidate or party they voted for last time. Some participants also talk of a move away from previous tactical voting to candidates they feel are more likely to represent their values.




"Coalition was not what I voted for."

"My choice offers better policies."

"I'm voting for who i want instead of a tactical vote."

"To hopefully get the balance right."

"The record of the party I voted for last time, they let us down."




My vote is both for those who best represent my ideological standpoint but it can also serve as a tactical vote to reduce the chances of the party of am most ideologically opposed to from winning.
